

Addressing the TB crisis in South Africa

On 10 August, the Treatment Action Campaign (TAC), Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF), the HIV Clinicians Society of Southern Africa and SECTION27 (formerly the AIDS Law Project) will bring together scientists, clinicians, nurses, activists, policy makers and government to discuss the crisis of tuberculosis (TB) faced in South Africa.

South Africa has a massive TB epidemic. With only 0.7% of the world population, we have 28% of the world population with dual HIV and TB infection.^[1] Between 1997 and 2005, there was a three-fold increase in recorded TB deaths.

The purpose of the meeting is to identify the key interventions South Africa needs to begin to turn around the epidemic. We want to galvanise politicians, health workers and activists to take action to stop TB.

The meeting will also identify priorities, to be submitted to the South African National AIDS Council, for the new National Strategic Plan (2012 -2016). The new national policy will adopt a single set of targets for both HIV and TB.

During the consultation we will also address the crisis of TB in the mines as well as the threatened supply of medicine for the treatment of drug resistant TB. The full agenda is available below.
